<u>Trustees' Report</u> Year Ended 31 August 2021

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditors' report of the charitable company for the year 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2021. The annual report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' report, and a Directors' report under company law.

The Trust operates four primary academies for pupils aged 3 to 11 serving a catchment area in Essington, Gentleshaw, Hednesford and Etching Hill. Its academies have a combined pupil roll of 1,489 pupils in the Autumn 21 school census for Reception to year 6 children which exceeds net capacity on two of the sites. All academies also offer a popular funded nursery and pre-school service for 2 and 3 year old children which is in addition to the statutory provision.

Organisation overview and current position

During 2020/21 the structure of Future Generation Trust (FGT) has remained stable as a sponsored Academy with a structure of Members and Trustees above the Local Governing Bodies. The Trust has a strong team of Trustees/Directors with a broad skill set. The Trust is in an excellent position to expand in a controlled and effective manner.

The Members are fully established and committed to the Trust. The five people have a wealth of experience to enable them to fulfil their responsibilities.

At Trustee level we are building a balanced team of people who have the necessary skill set and expertise to adequately support effective practice. At the time of the report there is one vacancy for an ICT lead, and recruitment is currently being undertaken. The addition of this specific skill will enhance the Trust Board and improve overall capacity.

Future Generation Trust is committed to a controlled journey of sustainable and effective growth towards establishing a team of six Good or Outstanding Primary Academies. In September 2021, Gentleshaw Primary Academy achieved a Good outcome from the Ofsted visit. We believe the model the Trust is promoting is an attractive proposition to Staffordshire schools who are looking to convert.

Structure, Governance and Management

Constitution

Future Generation Trust (the Trust) is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the Trust.

The Members act as the Trustees for the charitable activities of Future Generation Trust with Directors who report to the Members of the charitable company for the purposes of company law. The charitable company is known as Future Generation Trust.

Details of the Members and Directors who served throughout the year are included in the reference and administrative details on page 2.

Members' Liability

Each Member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while they are a Member, or within one year after they cease to be a Member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a Member.

Trustees' Indemnities

In accordance with the normal commercial practice the Trust has purchased insurance to protect its Members, Trustees/Directors, academy representatives and officers from claims arising from negligent acts, errors or omissions occurring whilst on Trust business. The insurance provider provides up to £2 million (2020: up to £2 million) in aggregate claims.

Principal Activities

The principal activities of the Trust are as set out in its Articles of Association namely:

To advance for the public benefit education in the United Kingdom, in particular but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing Academies which shall offer a broad and balanced curriculum and which shall include:

- Academies other than those designated Church of England, whether with or without a designated religious character; and
- Church of England academies designated as such which shall be conducted in accordance with the principles, practices and tenets of the Church of England both generally and in particular in relation to arranging for religious education and daily acts of worship, and in having regard to any advice and following any directives issued by the Diocesan Board of Education, but in relation to each of the Academies to recognise and support their individual ethos, whether or not designated Church of England.

Method of Recruitment and Appointment or Election of Trustees

The Directors of the Company comprise: (Article 12)

(a) The signatories to the Memorandum;

(b) CECET acting corporately by hand of its Director;

(c) The Chair of the Directors;

(d) The Vice Chair of the Directors; and

(e) Any person appointed under any of Articles 16, 16A or 16B

The Members with the written consent of the Diocesan Board of Education may agree by passing a special resolution in writing to appoint such additional Members as they think fit. (Article 16).

When appointing new Trustees, the Board of Trustees will give consideration to the skills and experience mix of existing Trustees in order to ensure the Board of Trustees has the necessary skills to contribute fully to the Trust's ongoing development.

The appointment of an Academy's Local Governing Body is detailed in the Terms of Reference of which the Trust Board elects the Chair. With regards to the appointment of parent governors, procedures are in place for their nomination, election and appointment.

Policies and Procedures Adopted for the Induction and Training of Trustees

Trustees bring a variety of experience from a number of different backgrounds in education, industry and commerce. The training and induction provided for new Trustees will depend upon their existing experience. Those coming via a role with a local governing body will receive governor training. Where necessary additional training will be provided on charity, educational, legal and financial matters. All Trustees are provided with copies of policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, budgets, plans and other documents they will need to undertake their role as Trustees. Assistance and advice is always available from Trust staff or professional advisors. Regular training sessions are offered by the Trust, the Local Authority and appropriate professional bodies.

Organisational Structure

Future Generation Trust has, as at 31 August 2021, four Academies within its Trust; St John's Primary Academy, Gentleshaw Primary Academy, St Peter's CE Primary Academy and Etching Hill CE Primary Academy.

The Directors of the Trust Board meet at least 6 times a year to discuss the strategic management and development of the Trust. The Directors approve all strategic decisions within the Trust and each Academy.

The Board of Directors establishes an overall framework for the governance of the Trust and determines membership, terms of reference and procedures of Committees of the Board of Trustees and other groups. It receives reports including policies from its Committees for ratification. It monitors the activities of the Committees through the minutes of their meetings and through direct reporting from the elected Chair of each Committee. The Board of Directors may from time to time establish working groups to perform specific tasks over a limited timescale.

There are two Committees of the Board of Directors as follows:

- Finance and Resources Committee
- Curriculum Committee

Each Committee has its own terms of reference detailing the responsibilities discharged to it. The Trustees have approved the addition of a Risk and Audit Committee to be created from January 2022.

The Academy Governors of the Local Governing Body and the respective committees meet at least once each term to discuss the specific relevant and strategic matters of the Academy. Each committee has Terms of Reference detailing their roles and responsibilities.

As of 1 September 2020, Future Generation Trust has a full-time CEO/Accounting Officer that leads a small administrative team composing a Head of Finance and Human Resources 0.75FTE (increased to full-time November 2020); a Head of Operations and Facilities 0.5 FTE (increased to 0.75FTE January 2021); and from that date a Clerk and Administrative Support Officer to support the Central Team. This team oversee all aspects of Trust's reporting and support staff within the individual academies. Each academy functions with a headteacher, an appropriately-sized leadership team and administrative support on site. They are responsible for the day-to-day organisation of the academy and delivering Trust policies.

The CEO oversees individual academy improvement plans and supports initiatives within each academy. They also provide advice and guidance while holding individual headteachers to account. The CEO also co-ordinates all joint initiatives across the academies which include training events and the contributions of specialist teachers. They also chair the Headteacher Board which meets at least termly.

The objectives of the Schemes of Delegation are to ensure that:

- the exercise of delegated powers and functions occur at the correct level of the corporate governance structure;
- the process of delegating powers or functions is clear, open and transparent;
- the lines of accountability for the exercise of powers or functions are clearly understood by those it is delegated to.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

The Directors of the Trust Board do not currently receive any remuneration for their services to the Trust in their capacity as Trustees/Directors. The pay and remuneration of key management personnel of each Academy is the responsibility of the Trust's Pay Committee, with annual performance appraisals being presented, and where applicable, feedback from the Local Governing Body's. The parameters and criteria used in setting the pay are the scales provided by the Local Authority for Teaching and Support Staff.

Related Parties and other Connected Charities and Organisations

There are no related parties or connected organisations which either control or significantly influence the decisions and operations of the Trust.

Future Generation Trust was incorporated on 13 February 2015 as a Multi-Academy Trust with one academy, St. John's Primary Academy, converting to academy status on 1 March 2015 from St John's CE (C) Primary School.

During the 2016/17 academic year the Trust applied for and successfully gained approval from the Regional School's Commissioner to become a Sponsored Trust of up to six academies. The relevant structural alterations were made at Member and Trustee level to accommodate this change in status and meet Department for Education requirements.

Objectives and Activities

Objects and Aims

The principal object of Future Generation Trust as set out in its Articles of Association is specifically restricted to the following:

To advance for the public benefit education in the United Kingdom, in particular but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing schools offering a broad and balanced curriculum.

The profile of St. John's Primary Academy is as follows:

St John's provides education for 3 to 11 year-old pupils. The curriculum is broad and balanced with an emphasis on developing the basic core skills of Literacy and Numeracy. The Academy predominantly draws pupils from the village of Essington and the surrounding areas including Willenhall and Short Heath.

The profile of Gentleshaw Primary Academy is as follows:

Gentleshaw now provides education for 3 to 11 year-old pupils. The curriculum is broad and balanced with an emphasis on developing the basic core skills of Literacy and Numeracy. The Academy predominantly draws pupils from the villages of Cannock Wood and the surrounding areas including Burntwood.

The profile of St Peter's CE Primary Academy is as follows:

St Peter's provides education for 3 to 11 year-old pupils. The curriculum is broad and balanced with an emphasis on developing the basic core skills of Literacy and Numeracy. The Academy predominantly draws pupils from the town of Hednesford and the surrounding areas.

The profile of Etching Hill CE Primary Academy is as follows:

Etching Hill provides education for 3 to 11 year-old pupils. The curriculum is broad and balanced with an emphasis on developing the basic core skills of Literacy and Numeracy. The Academy predominantly draws pupils from the village of Etching Hill and Rugeley.

Objectives, Strategies and Activities

Future Generation Trust continually strives for excellence.

The strong positive culture creates a climate conducive to learning throughout the academies in the Trust.

This climate promotes the acquisition of valuable life skills while supportive teaching built on a foundation of caring relationships established between staff and pupils leads to high levels of attainment and achievement.

Working with our pupils we aim to:

- Develop confidence, high self-esteem and a love of teaming;
- Promote respect of others and help them understand diversity and value everyone;
- Foster tolerance, resilience, perseverance and independence.

Public Benefit

All Academies within the Trust will provide high quality, motivated staff that plan and deliver learning opportunities to meet the needs of all its pupils.

The Academies will provide a bright attractive stimulating environment which is safe, warm and dry. The success of the Trust is not only based on teaching and learning but also the environment that the children work in. The Trust will have an ongoing program of facility reviews to ensure that the standards in place are not only maintained but also enhanced.

It will strive to develop strong Christian values in pupils and prepare them for adult lives where they will operate as happy individuals making positive contributions to society.

The sustained high performance of pupils over time in terms of attainment is of significant public benefit.

The Directors confirm that they have complied with the duty in the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission general guidance on public benefit in exercising their powers or duties. They have referred to this guidance when reviewing the Trust's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities.

Strategic Report

Achievements and Performance

Future Generation Trust continues to evolve and to adapt to the ever-changing educational environment. The Trust is in its 7th year of operation since conversion. The Trust is committed to continual improvement, which is achieved in a number of ways, including improvement planning, review meetings, continual professional development, lesson observations, performance management, self-evaluation, data analysis and action planning.

Key Performance Indicators (KPIs)

The monthly management accounts and information include KPIs that are both financial and non-financial. These include average teacher cost per pupil, average teacher cost per 1FTE teacher, staff cost percentages of income/expenditure and pupil numbers. All KPIs are shared regularly with Trustees with variances explored, reported and explained.

Covid 19 Impact

The impact of Covid 19 has been significant. Every aspect of our provision has been affected in some way. The closure of schools in the second lockdown, January and February 2021, presented considerable logistical issues. Key considerations are outlined below with reference to their influence upon our performance as a Trust.

Teaching and Learning

In the period between September 2020 and August 2021 we again witnessed significant disruption to teaching and learning across all academies. High levels of Covid-related absence for staff and pupils, partial and full closures of academies and ambiguous directives in an ever-changing national picture all significantly contributed to the turbulence that academies had to deal with. Against this back-drop leaders had to navigate a path that focussed upon maintaining a basic level of provision, leaving little scope for manoeuvre. In this context dynamic teaching and learning initiatives were difficult to deliver.

The national testing requirements were again removed by the Government. Key Stage 2 SATS papers in Maths and English were cancelled along with Year 1 phonics test. Teacher assessments were unable to be completed for Year 2 or any EYFS Assessments given the disruption that the pupils had suffered. The academies have therefore not produced any performance data associated with pupil progress and attainment.

All academies continued to encourage achievement through a consistent focus upon standards, high levels of presentation and the promotion of a positive work ethic. A variety of approaches to the 'Catch-Up' agenda were considered and academies responded in ways that best fitted their own position.

During the period there is evidence of curriculum development across the trust through collaboration and joint training initiatives that academies engaged with that have a direct influence upon teaching and learning.

These included:

· Relationships and Sex Education Policy.

Co-ordinators from each academy were involved in the designing of a policy to meet new statutory requirements. This working party liaised directly with the Central Team in this process and produced a coherent framework that supported the delivery of this subject across all academies. As a result, a uniform approach was adopted, and academies were fully supported through the consultation process with parents. The new curriculum, including elements of contentious content was subsequently successfully delivered. Parent challenges were addressed in a professional manner and the unified position adopted by the trust both supported and reassured staff.

Coaching

Opportunities for academy leaders to receive high quality coaching training was provided. Staff involved were able to develop coaching skills which they could use in their own setting and directly influence teacher performance. The additional capacity of available coaching enabled an increased number of issues to be addressed. Evidence of improved teacher performance was evident and deployment of this enhanced reservoir of coaching talent within the trust will be on going in the future.

Support Groups and Training

A trust network for NQT's was established with staff involved able to visit each other's settings, contact each other informally for support and receive training. Training focussed upon key headings of Learning Environment, Parent Partnerships, Inclusion, Reading, Differentiation and Learning Styles. An end of year celebration event was held, attended by trustees. All participants successfully completed their NQT year.

<u>Trustees' Report</u> Year Ended 31 August 2021

Writing Project

A whole trust Writing Project for Year 6 pupils was introduced. This focussed upon creativity and was also designed to motivate and engage pupils. The joint initiative further supported moderation and all staff involved found the experience hugely beneficial. A celebration event was held and pupils were introduced to a successful children's writer to further inspire them. A focus upon writing standards will continue.

Operations

School Meal services were maintained throughout the period. All FSM were provided, or food vouchers distributed, during the lockdown period.

It was necessary for excellent communication channels to be established with parents via the website and the text message/email systems that the academies normally employ.

During the summer term the Trust office building was completed and the Central Team moved into the dedicated accommodation on the St John's Primary Academy's site. This allows for the focus of the Central Team's work for all academies within the Trust and a conference room available for meetings and trainings.

<u>Finance</u>

There has been notable impact on individual Trust finances in terms of reduced income and increased expenditure. All normal income streams have been affected.

Revenue from before and after school provision was lost completely during lockdown and negatively impacted during the partial opening. The Trust Board agreed to access the Furlough facility for staff operating in this sector with the directive that the shortfall in salaries would be found from academy budgets.

Income from Key Stage 2 paid meals was also lost during this period although the government maintained funding for Universal Free School Meals and For Ever 6, Pupil Premium pupils' meals. Therefore unlike the previous lockdown the partial furlough facility was accessed for these employees within the Trust too.

Additional expenditure was incurred by all academies in their response to opening for the children of key workers and when all pupils returned to school. These costs mainly focussed upon additional cleaning materials to ensure that the building was suitably sanitised. The requirement for hand gel also added to costs along with protective equipment for staff. Further funding was needed in relation to the opening of the academies in ensuring relevant signage was displayed that encourage social distances and keep the school community informed of particular protocols in place.

Going Concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Board of Directors has a reasonable expectation that the Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Statement of Accounting Policies.

Financial Review

Financial Performance

Most of the Trust's income is obtained from the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) in the form of recurrent grants, the use of which is restricted. The grants received from the ESFA during the year ended 31 August 2021 and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The Trust also receives grants for fixed assets from the ESFA and other organisations / funders and these are shown as restricted fixed asset funds in the Statement of Financial Activities. The balance of the restricted fixed asset fund is reduced by the depreciation charges on the assets acquired using these funds.

Key financial policies adopted or reviewed during the period cover Financial Regulations, Fixed Asset, Risk Management, Tendering, Whistle Blowing, Anti-Fraudulent and Corruption and Director Expenses Policy. The guidance and regulations laid out in the annual Financial Handbook is considered and implemented, as is the Company's Financial Scheme of Delegation.

General funds (revenue funds)

Setting aside the pension fund and the fixed asset fund, the underlying position of the Trust's general revenue funds was a surplus of £76K for the year.

At the start of the year, the opening position on the accumulated general funds was a surplus of £1.05M and at the year end the Trust is now carrying forward a cumulative surplus of £1.13M. This is represented by a cumulative surplus on unrestricted general funds of £224K and a cumulative surplus on restricted general funds of £903K.

Financial Performance (continued)

The Covid-19 global pandemic that affected our academies had a significant impact on the finances of the Trust as detailed previously in this report. The self-generated income received via childcare and catering was reduced considerably during the part closures of the education sector.

Further details are shown within the notes to the accounts.

Pension deficit fund

The pension deficit reserve relates to the non-teaching staff pension scheme, where, unlike the teachers' pension scheme, separate assets are held to fund future liabilities. The deficit can be met in the longer term from any combination of increased employer or employee contributions, increased government funding or changes to the scheme benefits.

The movement on the pension deficit valuation for the year, as notified by the scheme actuary, was a further increase in the deficit of £1.53M, from £3.65M at the beginning of the year to £5.18M at the end of the year. The movement in the year is principally due to actuarial losses of some £1.05M. Further details are shown in the notes to the accounts.

Fixed assets fund

Capital grant of £485K was received from the DfE group in the year. Overall, the shortfall on the capital grant obtained versus the total capital expenditure incurred in the year was met by a transfer of £322K from General Funds.

After charging depreciation for the year of £171K, the fixed asset fund balance increased overall by £0.6M, from £9.1M at the beginning of the year to £9.7M at the end of the year.

Reserves Policy

The Trust's policy on reserves is to maintain sufficient reserves to enable the Trust to operate effectively in what is becoming a less certain economic and funding environment, to address any current year shortfall in funding, or to use them in the ongoing investment in the Academy estate, subject to satisfying terms and conditions of the grant funding.

The Trust will always ensure to stay within the ESFA guidelines on levels and appropriate use of reserves.

A minimum target level for reserves is not considered appropriate at this point in time, as the Trust is relatively new and therefore its main consideration is to build its reserves. The Trust Board monitors the cashflow to a very granular level and therefore when it is appropriate to consider reserves this will be implemented efficiently.

Investment Policy

The Board is committed to ensuring that all funds under their control are managed in such a way as to maximise return whilst minimising risks and will develop an investment and Treasury Management Policy, when considered appropriate. At present an agreed level of surplus funds are held in a 32-day deposit account.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The Board of Directors has assessed the major risks to which the trust is exposed and these are summarised in the trust's Risk Register. The Board of Directors have implemented a number of systems to assess risks that the Trust faces, especially in the operational areas (e.g. in relation to teaching, health and safety and safeguarding) and in relation to the control of finance. They have introduced mitigating controls, including operational procedures and internal financial controls in order to minimise risk. Where significant financial risk still remains they have ensured they have adequate insurance cover.

Fundraising

The Trust raises money for nationally recognised charities including Children in Need, Sport Relief and Comic Relief as and when they arise in the calendar, in addition to supporting the local churches and communities.

Plans for Future Periods

The Trust will focus upon the following areas in the immediate future:

Expansion

The Trust is currently involved with delivering system leader support to a vulnerable, local authority school. A funded partnership with the school has been agreed by the DfE and has the potential to lead to them joining our trust. Negotiations and discussions with other academies remain on-going.

Free School Proposal

The Trust remains committed to the submission of an application for a Free School Presumption. A suitable opportunity for the Deanslade Farm site in Lichfield has been identified and an application will be made in 2022.

Financial Management

The Trust will consider opportunities to centralise financial management as they emerge in both the accounting systems and the parent methods of payment. Uniform ways of working and cloud-based systems will support these moves and allow staff in locations away from the relevant academies to control operations.

Trading

Following the successful introduction of school based in service training for non-trust staff, Future Generation Trust will explore other opportunities to develop and deliver a range of courses. These will include middle leadership courses and leadership conferences.

Lead Teachers

The Trust will further develop curriculum support and collaborative working through the introduction of lead teaching roles in English and Maths. The roles will be appointed through a competitive process to attract high calibre staff to strengthen these subjects across all academies.

• Trust Based Training

The Trust will supplement the new Early Careers Framework with internal support programmes for the ECT's and mentors. Other training opportunities will be introduced for aspiring middle leaders, specific subject areas and SEN.

• Classroom Provision

Capacity issues at St. John's Primary Academy and Etching Hill CE Primary Academy will be addressed by the appropriate building programmes.

Funds Held as Custodian Trustee on Behalf of Others

The Trust does not hold such funds and does not act as the custodian trustees of any other charity.

Auditor

In so far as the Trustees are aware:

Scope of Responsibility

- Scrutinise the Trust and Academy budgets and finance, health and safety, staffing and estates arrangements;
- Oversee the financial risk, internal controls and management of the Trust and Academy.

Review of Value for Money

As Accounting Officer, the Chief Executive Officer has responsibility for ensuring that the Multi Academy Trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The Accounting Officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The Accounting Officer considers how the Trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the board of trustees where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where appropriate. The Accounting Officer for the Trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

Central Office

The natural evolution of the Trust in establishing itself as a separate entity to St. John's Primary Academy, the founder academy, and development of the Central Team roles and responsibilities presented a strong argument for the creation of a modest central office. A variety of options were available which included an office extension on the main St. John's Academy building, a rental agreement with a private company for office accommodation and a general feasibility study across other academy sites to identify opportunities to exploit.

Outline costs for all these aspects were considered and dismissed on the basis of value for money. A rental agreement offered little long-term security and did not invest in our own trust estate, the extension costs at St. John's were prohibitive based on the need for substantial, initial groundworks and structural work while it was deemed unlikely that a study of other academy sites was unlikely to prove fruitful given the local knowledge at our disposal, significantly around parking issues.

A further option to convert and enhance an existing separate build on the St. John's site offered a stronger value for money option. It provided the required floor space without high building costs and allowed the trust to have an identity detached from that of St. John's. Provision of services was supported by the original build and building time was not disrupted by working around pupil timetables and avoided costly delays. The project was eventually delivered on budget.

• Rationalisation of Academy Administrative Software

The CEO, CFO and academy headteachers carried out a full review of the market leaders in both Management Information Systems and online income management. The aim of this process was to select a 'best of breed' system that all academies would adopt. Rationalising our approach in this way provided the opportunity to obtain a discounted price based upon the number of academies who were going to buy-in and the ability to share training costs. There were also further opportunities for cross academy support, which potentially negated the need for additional cover costs in the event of staff absence. Once in place the uniform products could provide greater consistency and allow for comparative studies to be undertaken. This could in turn highlight best practice and share expertise within the trust.

Key administrative staff within the academies were also tasked with evaluating these commercial products and provide leaders with a 'shop-floor' view of their user friendliness and overall effectiveness. Representatives from the relevant companies were invited to 'pitch' their product and provide competitive tenders.

Initial training and system set up proved to be highly efficient once the products had been selected at the end of this robust process.

• Lease Line Provision

The new Central Office required investment in ICT Infrastructure to provide suitable business, broadband support. A leased line solution involving the rental of a dedicated connection that ensures that bandwidth remains fixed was considered the most appropriate solution.

This offered value for money in several ways. Firstly, it allowed remote IT systems employed by the trust to be reliable, avoiding unnecessary time wasting with low download speeds. It also presented FGT as professional and contemporary which in turn contributed to the overall image the trust wishes to promote of an effective, efficient and cutting-edge business.

A further financial advantage was the potential to incorporate a web-based phone system, offering low -cost multiple lines, with desktop and smartphone connectivity. This reduced call charges and provided a fully integrated system providing user friendly reports on call logs, instant messaging, and call recording. All these features contribute to allowing the Central Team to monitor and minimise costs.

The final advantage was that it offered the potential for the main academy site to 'piggy-back' the lease line when their broadband contract expired. This will allow monthly charges to be shared. The installation of the lease line incorporated future proofing measures to allow this option should the academy choose.

Once the lease line solution was decided upon a full and rigorous tendering exercise was undertaken with 4 main providers invited to submit project prices. The most competitive price was chosen from the received tenders and the work was completed on budget.

The Purpose of the System of Internal Control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can, therefore, only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of Trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically.

The system of internal control has been in place in Future Generation Trust for the period 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2021 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Capacity to Handle Risk

The Board has reviewed the key risks to which the Trust Is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The Board of Directors is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the Trust's significant risks that has been in place for the period 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2021 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the Board of Directors.

The Risk and Control Framework

The Trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reviews which are reviewed and agreed by the board of trustees;
- regular reviews by the Finance and Resources committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- delegation of authority and segregation of duties;
- identification and management of risks.

The Board of Directors considered the need for a specific internal audit function and MLG Education Services Limited have carried out this role throughout the reporting period.

The internal auditor's role includes giving advice on financial matters and performing a range of checks on the Multi-Academy Trust's financial systems. In particular, the checks carried out in the current period included:

- Transaction testing (at each academy) in the following areas to ensure controls are in place and that transactions comply with the academy's financial regulations:
 - o Payroll
 - o Purchasing including credit cards
 - o Expenses Income
- Review the "Must" areas of the Academies Financial Handbook.
- Accounting
 - o Monthly reconciliations (including bank)
 - Financial reporting
 - o ESFA financial returns

On a regular basis, the internal auditor reports to the Board of Directors, through the Finance and Resources committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the Board of Directors' financial responsibilities.

The internal auditor has delivered their schedule of works.

As the Trust's growth plans for 2021/22 will potentially see a further school join the Trust, the Board has a Director with specific skills aligned to Risk and Audit to ensure that this area has internal expertise to oversee the framework and to take an active role in the ongoing development. The addition of the separate Risk and Audit Committee in January 2022 will reinforce the focus in this area.

Review of Effectiveness

As Accounting Officer, the Chief Executive has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the period in question the review has been informed by:

- the work of the internal auditor;
- the work of the external auditor:
- the financial management and governance self-assessment process;
- the work of the executive managers within the Trust who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

The Accounting Officer has been advised of the implications of the result of the review of the system of internal control by the Finance and Resources Committee and a plan to address weaknesses and ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

Our engagement includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the regularity and propriety of the charitable company's income and expenditure.

The work undertaken to draw to our conclusion includes:

- An assessment of the risk of material irregularity and impropriety across the academy trust's activities;
- A review of governance procedures;
- A review of financial budgeting and monitoring procedures;
- A review of related/ connected party transactions in accordance with internal processes and the Academies Financial Handbook;
- A review and sample testing of internal financial controls; and
- A review and sample testing of procurement procedures.

In the course of our work, nothing has come to our attention which suggests that in all material respects the expenditure disbursed and income received during the period 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2021 has not been applied to purposes intended by Parliament and the financial transactions do not conform to the authorities which govern them.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the year ended 31 August 2021

1 Accounting policies

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland', the Academies Accounts Direction 2020 to 2021 issued by the ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Going concern

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the academy trust to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements and have concluded that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern, thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the academy trust has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance related conditions), where it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Other income

Other income including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the academy trust has provided the goods or services.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Goods donated for resale are included at fair value, being the expected proceeds from sale less the expected costs of sale. If it is practical to assess the fair value at receipt, it is recognised in stock and 'Income from other trading activities'. Upon sale, the value of the stock is charged against 'Income from other trading activities' and the proceeds are recognised as 'Income from other trading activities'. Where it is impractical to fair value the items due to the volume of low value items they are not recognised in the financial statements until they are sold. This income is recognised within 'Income from other trading activities'.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Raising funds

Raising funds includes all expenditure incurred by the academy trust to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities, events and non-charitable trading.

Charitable activities

Costs of charitable activities are incurred on the academy trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the academy trust apportioned to charitable activities.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the year ended 31 August 2021

1 Accounting policies

Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £2,500 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance Sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. The related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Depreciation on such assets is charged to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities so as to reduce the fund over the useful economic life of the related asset on a basis consistent with the Academy's depreciation policy.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its expected useful lives, as follows:

Leasehold buildings-2% per year (50 years)Furniture and equipment-10% per year (10 years)Computer equipment-33% per year (3 years)Motor vehicles-25% per year (4 years)

Assets in the course of construction are included at cost. Depreciation on these assets is not charged until they are brought into use.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the academy trust has an obligation at the reporting date as a result of a past event which it is probable will result in the transfer of economic benefits and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

Leased Assets

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Financial instruments

The academy trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy trust and their measurement basis are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 14. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank - is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 15. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the academy trust at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Education and Skills Funding Agency/Department for Education.

Taxation

The academy trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the academy trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by chapter 3 part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the year ended 31 August 2021

1 Accounting policies

Pension benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary based on quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to net income/(expenditure) are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below:

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost (income) for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 20, will impact upon the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore, a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2019 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2021. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

20 Pension and similar obligations

The Academy's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teacher's Pension Scheme for England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff, and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by Staffordshire County Council. Both are Multi-employer Defined Benefit Pension Schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2016 and of the LGPS 31 March 2019.

Contributions amounting to £122,459 were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2021 (2020: £64,587) and are included within creditors.

Teachers' pension scheme Introduction

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary - these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the teachers' pension scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016 and in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019. The key elements of the valuation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% administration levy);
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £218,100 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million, giving a notional past service deficit of £22,000 million;
- the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 2.4% above the rate of CPI. assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return including earnings growth is 4.45%.

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2023.

The pension costs paid to TPS in the period amounted to £614,167 (2020: £567.319).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local government pension scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined-benefit scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the period ended 31 August 2021 was £615,000 (2020: £560,000), of which employer's contributions totalled £503,000 (2020: £454,000), and employees' contributions totalled £112,000 (2020: £106,000). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 25.2% for employers and a range of 5.5% to 9.9% for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy trust closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.
